She was a co-creator of the Rochester ALC Green Thumb Initiative. She worked tirelessly to help the students in her classroom make a difference in the world they lived.

At New Harmony High, she was loved and admired by the students who recognized the absolute honesty and fearlessness with which she approached everything she did. Liz's spirit will forever be preserved at New Harmony through the many projects she founded and lives she touched, including teaching Chemistry, designing a project-based Algebra curriculum, founding the Outdoor Adventures PE program and planning garden activities. As an educator she was inspired by the following quote from Point Break "This was never about the money. This was about us against the system. That system that breaks the human spirit". That inspiration was evident in her teaching style - a blend of intelligence, compassion and tenacity that touched so many lives.

Liz was thankful for family and friends, honesty, butterflies and dragonflies, moonbeams and rainbows, flowers, smiles and laughs, wishing stars, imagination, good conversation, forgiveness, and love. She could not tolerate: watching people suffer, sitting when there is something she could be doing, judging people on their differences, or jeopardizing her integrity. She was an artist in every facet of her life, including her beautifully designed home and most notably, her sense of fashion.

She will be deeply missed by her mother, Diane Holland, her brother Michael Quackenbush and sister-in-law Jax Quackenbush, her two nieces Redding and Sloan Quackenbush, many dear aunts and uncles, cousins, friends, colleagues, and her

students.
